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# **President's Report**Anne Camplin



# "Building Inclusive Pathways to Volunteering"

In 2025, VNQ delivered two flagship initiatives that stand as highlights of the year: the inaugural VEXPO volunteer expo and the Volunteer Appreciation Tour.

The **VEXPO**, held in Townsville, was a resounding success. With 104 attendees and 41 community organisations represented, the event became a vibrant marketplace of opportunity. Its greatest strength lay in inclusivity: 49% of participants identified as First Nations, 41% as living with disability, 51% as young people, and 32% as unemployed. This diversity demonstrated that volunteering truly is for everyone and that VNQ can reach those who most need connection.

Early results were powerful—15 organisations reported new volunteer sign-ups directly from the expo, and many more benefited from new collaborations and networks.

Alongside this, the **Volunteer Appreciation Tour** reached out to 11 communities across our region. Over four months, VNQ hosted 10 gatherings (with the final rescheduled for July due to community timing), celebrating more than 300 volunteers. These events weren't only about saying thank you—although our cookies, gift packs, and recognition messages were well received—they were also about listening. We gathered valuable feedback on barriers to participation, training needs, and volunteer motivations. Each event also featured a 20-minute "Tips and Tricks" micro-training session, covering practical topics such as writing volunteer role descriptions. The response was overwhelmingly positive, and the information gathered is now shaping our 2026 training calendar.

Together, these initiatives achieved both recruitment and retention outcomes: new volunteers were connected to opportunities through VEXPO, while existing volunteers were celebrated and supported through the Tour.

# **Overcoming Challenges with Resilience**

Our journey was not without its obstacles. Delivering the VEXPO required creative problem-solving: limited budgets, a short lead time, and the challenges of venue logistics could have dampened the experience. Instead, through strong community partnerships, volunteer support, and adaptability on the day, the expo exceeded expectations.

# **President's Report Cont'd**



The Volunteer Appreciation Tour had its own hurdles, particularly in coordinating schedules across multiple communities. When one group's quarterly meeting cycle clashed with our timeframe, we adapted rather than cancelled, ensuring every volunteer received recognition. These challenges reinforced our belief that flexibility and persistence are at the heart of successful community engagement.

VNQ also navigated organisational challenges, such as changes in key contacts changing or going on leave, which temporarily disrupted our volunteer referral pipeline. By investing in relationship-building and consistency, we turned those difficulties into opportunities, resulting in a more stable referral process and ongoing collaboration.

## **Partnerships and Sector Support**

Volunteering does not exist in isolation. Our work is embedded in the broader community services sector, where volunteers deliver essential programs in aged care, disability support, youth services, and emergency response. This year, VNQ's partnerships with Centrelink, Workforce Australia, JCU, local councils, Corporate sponsors and community organisations have been vital.

The VEXPO expanded the volunteer pool available to organisations, while the Tour supported retention and recognition—two of the sector's most pressing needs. Volunteers gained new pathways into employment, organisations gained fresh capacity, and communities became more connected.

Importantly, our role as a Volunteer Referral Centre (VRC) continued to connect individuals with meaningful roles. In an environment where volunteer numbers have been declining nationally, our referral service remains a lifeline for both volunteers and organisations.

## **Measuring Outcomes and Impact**

Effectiveness must be measured not only in numbers but also in impact. This year's outcomes include:

- 104 attendees and 41 organisations engaged at the VEXPO, with 15 new volunteer sign-ups reported.
- 300+ volunteers celebrated across 11 communities during the Volunteer Appreciation Tour.
- Satisfaction rating of 7.3/10 for the VEXPO, achieved on a modest budget of \$5,000.
- Diverse participation, with significant engagement of First Nations people, people with disability, young people, and unemployed individuals.
- Practical training delivered, including micro-sessions on volunteer management, with take-home resources provided.
- Volunteer feedback collected to shape our 2026 training calendar, ensuring our programs remain evidence-based and relevant.
- Referrals- Our Core Business- At our Peak when Fully funded we placed over 1,600 volunteers annually, today purely run on 1 volunteer, we referred 800 last year and on track to do more in 2025-2026- Evidenced based data straight from Victor

Beyond the numbers, volunteers told us they felt valued, inspired, and motivated to continue giving back. Organisations reported stronger pipelines of support and greater confidence in managing their volunteer workforce.

# **President's Report Cont'd**

## **Looking Ahead**

The achievements of 2025 lay a strong foundation for the future. The VEXPO is now positioned as an **annual flagship event**, with the potential to expand to other North Queensland regions in 2026. The Volunteer Appreciation Tour has demonstrated the importance of localised recognition and consultation, and we aim to embed this as an ongoing program.

We are also preparing to roll out the Voluntoolkit, an online resource hub designed to save community groups time and effort by curating trusted tools, templates, and information in one accessible place. This project has been shaped by feedback from grassroots organisations and will ensure that even the smallest volunteer groups have access to professional resources.

Our Back-to-Basics training series will continue to upskill community organisations, with new modules planned, including sessions on corporate volunteering and meaningful partnerships. These initiatives align with our strategic plan to strengthen volunteering pathways, reduce isolation, and build resilient communities.

# New Partnerships already in planning stages:

In 2019, following the devastating North Queensland floods, TAFE Queensland delivered the Volunteers and Events Training Program with approximately \$800,000 in Commonwealth and Queensland Government support under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.



This initiative provided free training and study tours for paid and unpaid event organisers in disaster-affected communities, focusing on building skills, resilience, and leadership capacity to help the tourism and events industry recover. We have commenced the next steps into revitalising this program with TAFE.

## **Gratitude and Acknowledgements**

None of this work would be possible without the dedication of our volunteers. staff, and partners, in addition to our board for their leadership and guidance. To our funders and sponsors, their investment enables us to amplify the power of volunteering. To our own staff and Volunteers, their passion and hard work drive every success. And most the thousands importantly. to volunteers across North Queenslandthey are the heart of our communities, and VNQ exists to celebrate and support them.

This year, VNQ has proven once again that when we connect, upskill, and celebrate volunteers, the whole community benefits. Through innovation, inclusivity, and resilience, we have delivered programs that not only meet immediate needs but also build lasting capacity for the future.

As we move into 2026, we do so with confidence, energy, and a clear vision: to be the leading volunteering hub in North Queensland, ensuring that every person has the opportunity to contribute, connect, and thrive through volunteering. Together, we are building stronger, more connected communities—and that is something we can all be proud of.

# **Treasurer's Report**Ernie Bunt



This year has been one of both challenge and achievement for Volunteering North Queensland. We were very fortunate to receive \$50,000 from Townsville City Council to deliver grassroots training and another \$50,000 from Volunteering Queensland under the VMA funding from the Department of Social Services.

These grants enabled us to deliver significant outcomes across the region — and as the President's Report highlights, we achieved an extraordinary amount on what can only be described as a shoestring budget.

Evidence-based data remains central to our work and to our commitment to transparency with our funders. Although we operated at a loss this year, we managed to stay under budget in many day-to-day expenses thanks to a small but dedicated team who consistently went above and beyond.

We are deeply grateful for the strong partnerships that made our successes possible — particularly Volunteering Queensland, Townsville City Council, and Workforce Australia. Their collaboration was instrumental in the success of both the Volunteer Appreciation Tour and the Volunteer Expo, which exceeded all expectations.

While the financial year ended on a more positive note than it began, we recognise there is still much work to be done to achieve long-term sustainability. We will continue to seek ways to contain costs without compromising our obligation to deliver quality support and service to our community.

Our most pressing challenge remains the lack of operational funding. While we currently have over \$700,000 in project-based grants pending submission, these funds—if successful—are restricted to project delivery and do not support the day-to-day running of the organisation. Without core operational funding, the year ahead will be extremely challenging.

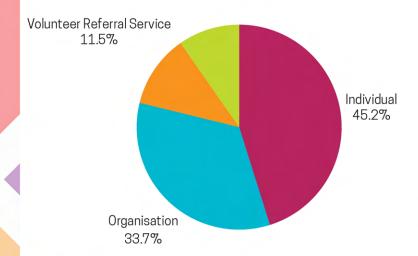

# **Membership and Referral Statistics Report**



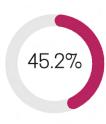


The total number of memberships Volunteering North Queensland had for the 24-25 financial year was 392.

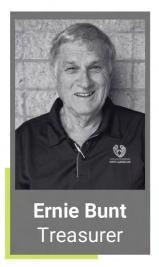

# VOLUNTEERING NORTH QUEENSLAND INC ABN 89 493 383 445 NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

### 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statement are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### **Basis of Preparation**

In the officer's opinion, the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general financial statements.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the *Associations Incorporation Act (Qld) 1981* and associated regulations. The officers have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of Volunteering North Queensland Incorporated.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 1031 'Materiality '1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

#### Historical Cost Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The area involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in Note 2.

#### (a) Current and Non-Current Classification

Assets and Liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset in current when: it is expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.



A liability is current when: it is expected to be settled in normal operation cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to differ the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-currents.

## (b) Trade and Other Receivables

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any provision for impairment.

### (c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents include Gash on Hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

## (d) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Plant & Equipment 3-7 years Office Equipment 3-5 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no further economic benefit to the incorporated association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

### (e) Employee Benefits

## Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled within twelve months of the reporting date are recognised in current liabilities in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

## Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within twelve months of the reporting date are recognised in non-current liabilities, provided there is an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability. The liability is measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.



## (f) Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

## (g) Income Tax

At the incorporated association is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

### (h) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the incorporated association and the revenue can be measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

#### Grant Revenue

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

### Interest Revenue

Interest Revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the related period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

## (i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Statement of Financial Position are shown inclusive of GST.

## 2 Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgments, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.



Employee benefits provision

As discussed in Note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than twelve months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attribution rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.
